

From the Board President & Executive Director

We are happy to share the highlights of our 31st year of improving lives for brain injury survivors and their families. It is an honor to work with our staff, board and volunteers to assist thousands of people each year--sharing education, support, and rehabilitation with so many who have nowhere else to turn. We thank our amazing team and we thank YOU for contributing to our success through your generosity and kindness.

This past year we realized a dream of ours - to be known as Schurig Center for Brain Injury Recovery. When the change was announced, a few friends of the organization wondered why. It's true that our name was changed from Marin Brain Injury Network to BINBA five years ago. But even before that we wanted a name that honored our founder and was uniquely our own. We are a center that provides healing, education, support and rehabilitation. So we wanted a name that highlighted hope and recovery. Our new name honors Karen Schurig and the recovery process undertaken by those impacted by brain injury and stroke. We are thrilled with our new name and hope you are as well.

In addition to changing our name, we hosted our 5th annual Brain*Art*Music Gala fundraiser, hired new team members, expanded our Board of Directors, added new services, and reached over 3,000 people with information, education and treatment. Additionally, we joined forces to create a concussion education coalition. The group will be launching a standard of care and education plan for concussion management in March of 2017.

Schurig Center Teams Up for Concussion Education

In the past few years, there has been a flurry of media coverage regarding concussion statistics in sports and incidence of CTE (chronic traumatic encephalopathy), a degenerative disease found in deceased athletes who have sustained repeated blows to the head during their sports career. This coverage is good for helping community members become aware of a growing issue of safety in sports, however there is great need for community education about the causes, symptoms, and care of concussion.

In response to new legislation and the need to protect our youth, a team has formed to address the issue of safety in sports, particularly at the high school level. While Schurig Center has provided concussion education and an informational website for years (www.concussionmarin.org), we were honored to join this team of professionals to create and disseminate a standard level of education and care for our county. This educational program will be launched in March of 2017, during National Brain Injury Awareness Month, and will reach students, athletes, coaches, teachers, parents, physicians and emergency room personnel.

The team consists of professionals from the following organizations: County of Marin, Kaiser Permanente, Marin County Athletic League, Marin County Office of Education, Marin General Hospital, Schurig Center, and Sutter Health.

A few facts...

- 4 to 5 million concussions occur annually, with rising numbers among middle school athletes
- 90% of most diagnosed concussions do not involve a loss of consciousness
- 67% of all sports concussions happen during games, with 33% happening during practice
- 33% of high school athletes who have a sports concussion report two or more in the same year
- 39% -- the amount by which cumulative concussions are shown to increase catastrophic head injury leading to permanent neurologic disability



Current Services & Programs

All services are offered on a sliding-scale or free of charge, with a few services accepting Medi-Care and insurance reimbursement.

Structured Therapeutic Treatment Program •

Offered for adults living with an acquired brain injury (ABI/TBI), an array of classes to enhance cognitive, social, and behavioral abilities. All classes are taught by instructors trained in the field of brain injury who have received education and training in a range of modalities including art therapy, counseling, social work, occupational therapy, speech therapy. Monday to Thursday.

ABI/TBI Survivor Education and Support Group •

Provides support and education in the areas of brain anatomy, cognitive enhancement, coping strategies, emotional adjustment, and rebuilding life post brain injury. Other topics are addressed based on the group's interests and needs. Facilitated by a specialist in the field of brain injury. Meets Tuesdays for 1.5 hours

Family/Caregiver Support Group • We recognize the enormous pressures and risks of family care giving – burnout, compromised health, depression, and depletion of financial resources. For this reason, we offer this support group providing a supportive, educational environment to enhance the caregiver's understanding of the cognitive, emotional and life changes resulting from a brain injury. Facilitated by a specialist in the field of brain injury rehabilitation. One Saturday each month, 10:30am-12:00pm

Art and Education Class for Survivors • Offered concurrently with the Caregiver Support Group to help provide flexibility for caregivers to attend the support group. One Saturday each month, 10:30am-12:00pm

Concussion Information Web site & Community Presentations • Community and school based presentations available. Web site offering concussion education and information: www.concussionmarin.org

Education & Prevention Presentations •

Presentations provide education about ABI/TBI and prevention information to community organizations and groups, sports leagues, and professional conferences. Available upon request. **Post-Concussion Education Class** • Support and education for adults living with side effects from concussion. Facilitated by Dr. Jim Wilson, PhD, a licensed Neuropsychologist. Offered as a series of monthly sessions, 6:00pm-7:30pm.

Individual Therapeutic Computer Program ITCP •

Computer based exercises provided in a fun and interactive environment designed to increase cognitive abilities and achieve specific personal goals. Facilitated by Ducie Wagner, a skilled instructor with 25 years of experience teaching this program. Monday to Thursday.

Neuropsychological Assessment & Individual

Consultation • Assessments, consultations and therapy sessions for individuals with ABI/TBI and their family members. Provided by Dr. Jim Wilson, PhD, a licensed Neuropsychologist. Tuesdays.

Occupational Therapy • Individual evaluations, treatment sessions, and consultations for adults living with ABI/TBI provided by Maggie Smida, OTR/L, licensed Occupational Therapist. **Offered weekly.**

Resource Referral Service • Consultation to provide assistance finding and accessing community resources for survivors, families, and professionals.

Speech Therapy Classes & Individual Sessions • Designed to improve communication abilities for adults living with a brain injury. Facilitated by Kalynn Stewart, MS, CCC-SLP, a licensed speech therapist specializing in brain injury. Offered weekly.

Yoga Movement & Mindfulness Classes •

Led by Certified Yoga Instructors from the Stress Management Center of Marin (SMC), these classes help participants to reduce the symptoms of depression and stress and connect anew to self and others. Open to survivors, caregivers, and family members. Offered weekly.

Keeping Hope Alive (Support Group For Stroke Survivors) • Facilitated by Carol Howard Wooton,

MFT, a stroke survivor with over 30 years experience leading support groups and sharing her expertise in the area of healing after stroke. Monday and Friday.

Who We Served

Schurig Center is the only non-profit, post-acute therapeutic center in the North Bay offering an array of affordable rehabilitative and supportive services designed to help survivors and their families rebuild their lives after a brain injury. We also support professionals, interns in training, and the community at large.
